Dear All In the Anglican Community, Easter season starts with Lent, which is a retro of fasting, self-examination and denial. Moreover, Lent is also an opportunity to support the less fortunate. Easter is a time for reflection on the suffering and sacrifice of our Lord Jesus Christ to save us.

The period is significant in the Anglican liturgical Calendar. The Lectionary summonses us to the events of the gospel – beginning with Ash Wednesday which ends in Holy Week. Holy Week begins with Palm which honours Sunday. lesus's triumphant entry into Jerusalem on a donkey. Then Maundy Thursday, a reminder of the last meal which lesus ate with his disciples - the Eucharist (bread and wine) and washing of the disciple's feet. The next day is Good Friday, a day to remember Jesus's death on the cross. On Easter Sunday the Church celebrates lesus's resurrection.

To mark the significance of the season the Church sets aside time of prayer and fellowship. Whereby reflections of how lesus died for us is done collectively. While to the wider public the period of Christmas has become more famous and is celebrated, to Christians the Easter period is more significant as it is the time when we remember Christ's death and resurrection. It is for this reason that Christ was sent to the world so that mankind can be forgiven sins.

hopeless. Paul in 1 Corinthians 15:3–8 says "For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me".

Prior to Easter there is a period of 40 days called Lent. According to the Church calendar Lent begins on Ash Wednesday up to almost 6 weeks before Easter Sunday. The traditional purpose of Lent is the preparation of the believer through prayer, penitence, almsgiving, atonement and self-denial. Some Christians commit to fasting and giving up to some luxuries as a form of penitence.

It is also a busy period where some families meet. A number of activities are held. In the wider community things like Easter eggs are sold.

Easter is celebrated in diverse ways. It is a time of witnessing where souls are saved, and lives transformed. People focus on the hope we have of the risen Christ, reminding each other of the power of the cross.

(I now know that clock people call them wheels.). The one I bought for about £20, was, as you can see in the photo, very dirty and some of the arbors were bent.

When I was younger and cars were much less complicated, and purely mechanical, I

used, as a matter of necessity, to spend the weekend fixing our car. So how



Eventually I had it all back together and amazingly it worked. To be honest, I put it together several times, before it ticked and struck the hours properly. It has a $9^{1/2}$ inch pendulum, which means its tick-tock is 1 second. Next it needed a case. Google showed me what it probably looked like; an American short-drop schoolhouse clock. I



difficult can it be? It's purely mechanical and I have lots of time on my hands, surely I can figure it out! And, after all, it was only £20. So I took it apart, (very easy) and cleaned all the brass bits, and got rid of the rust. It tuned out to be a Seth Thomas clock, made in the USA probably over a hundred years ago. So here it is in bits after cleaning, nice and shiny.



admit I made some parts of the case several times, especially the eight sided surround, originally in pine and then remade in oak.

The result, four years later is still on my office wall and still ticking away. It keeps quite good time, not quite to the standard of the quartz clocks we have become used to, but alright. MW



Roadmap to re-opening the Baker Arms

With the pub now listed as an Asset of Community Value (ACV) we have informed AHDC that we intend to make a bid for the pub. We have obtained a professional commercial valuation and written to McM to get their response.. This may trigger a further meeting with Tom McMullen. We are starting the process to set up a Community Benefit Society and Community Interest Company which will allow us to receive funding from the government scheme.

Friends in all the right places

We're not going it alone! An application has been lodged with the Plunkett Foundation, a charity that offers help and professional advice to groups in rural areas seeking to acquire and run community-owned businesses. FOBA have had a number of Zoom meetings with our Plunkett consultant, Mark Golding, which were extremely useful. We're also hearing from other community pub groups, like the Red Lion in Aston who have recently opened under community ownership. Some great people have offered to help - we'd love to hear from anyone else who has expertise in community engagement, the planning development svstem. and construction, fundraising and food and drink

The Right of Way Issue.

In September (a few months after the closure of the pub), large planters were placed across the entry/exit to the car park to prevent vehicle access. Although a gap was left so walkers could still pass through, large signs were fixed to the planters stating 'No Public Right of Way'. The route via the car park provides the only safe way between Ashendene Road and Brickendon Lane because it avoids the

very dangerous bend in the road where there is no footpath. Therefore, it has always been much used by walkers, especially those going to the station, and also horse riders.

The 'blocking' of this route was discussed at a Parish Council meeting and, as the future of the pub and its land are uncertain and the signs use the legal wording to challenge the public's right to use the route, it was agreed that an application should be made to Hertfordshire County Council to record the route as a public right of way.

To claim a right of way through public use you need to provide evidence that it has been used openly (without force, secrecy or permission) for the last 20 years. We will be circulating 'User Evidence Forms' to Bayford residents to collect this information but if you live outside the village and used route regularly have this between 2003-2023 we would be interested to hear from vou. GARDENING FEBRUARY

Our present climate seems to be becoming more and more varied and we must somehow adjust to what now seem our rather out of date ideas that we have gone along with for so long if we are to work with this. We must plan the months ahead accordingly but without spoiling our enjoyment!

February has always been the month for much of our regular pruning so that we keep our trees and shrubs in some sort of order. Look at your fruit trees and cut back branches that are crossing or rubbing and remove straggly branches back to a good bud to encourage regrowth and reduce any remaining growth by a third. Cut back autumn-fruiting raspberries to the ground and clear up all the bits. You can lightly prune large-flowered Clematis remembering that 'if it usually flowers before June, don't prune" but if it flowers later carefully cut it back to 15-30cm from the ground. Prune your bush and shrub roses, again removing any damaged or 'cross over' branches. Shrubs such as Buddleia, Salix and Russian Sage can also be treated in this way -the harder they are carefully pruned the more they will flower. Always use sharp tools for pruning and use garden compost to mulch plants afterwards leaving a gap round the stem base. Weed around the base of trees and pull off any suckers. Snowdrops seem to be at their very best in those early weeks of February and they spread both by seed and division – clumps should be lifted and carefully split up and re-planted every few years and, unusually for most bulbs, they are at their happiest in damp soil. Get the onion sets into the ground as soon as the soil is ready and you can work a fine tilth Looking ahead, place cloches over strawberries to bring them into flower early and continue to enjoy your gardens whether they are large or small!
